## MINER GUILTY, JURY DECIDES

### Will Receive Sentence For Beating Young Child of Housekeeper

SALT LAKE CITY, Dec. 19.—(AP)—George Jagers, 44-year-old unemployed miner of Bingham Canyon, languished in jail here today awaiting sentence on a charge of assault and battery growing out of the brutal beating of 21-month-old Clara Louise Cobb.

Jagers was found guilty of the charge by a jury in city court here yesterday afternoon. The maximum penalty is six months in the county jail and a fine of \$200. City Judge A. H. Ellett said he would pronounce sentence tomorrow morning.

Jagers was accused of beating the youngster December 6 while she was in his custody during the absence of the child's mother, who was employed as Jagers' housekeeper.

## IDAHO CAPTAIN FOUND IN HILLS

### Fought To Avoid Freezing During Two Nights; Is Shell Shocked

POCATELLO, Dec. 19.—(AP)—Captain Harold T. Stoy of the Idaho national guard, lost for more than 36 hours, was found alive here today after wandering through the hills apparently in a shell-shocked condition. At his home he told of a fight to keep from freezing to death during two cold nights in the snow-swept hills around the city.

Captain Stoy failed to return home Monday night from a lodge meeting and members of his command were called out yesterday morning to search for him. He served in the Marine corps during the World war and suffered from shell shock.

His father, Archdeacon Howard Stoy of the Boise cathedral of the Protestant Episcopal church, arrived here this morning to aid in the search.

## Blast Places Large Smokestack In Ruins

SALT LAKE CITY, Dec. 19.—In the presence of a great crowd, kept at a safe distance, a 6000 ton masonry smokestack at the Garfield smelter was dynamited Tuesday afternoon. The stack has been idle since erection of a 407 foot concrete structure.

There was a deafening explosion as if a battleship had fired all its 14-inch guns together. The old smokestack seemed to budge at the base, smoke and dust flew in all directions.

Down through the cloud the smokestack settled like a ship's funnel sinking into the sea. When two-thirds of its length had thus collapsed, telescope-like, the remaining third tilted to the east before crashing.

## BLOOD URGES QUICK PAYMENT

### Weber Beet Growers Want Money; Moratorium Plea Denied

SALT LAKE CITY, Dec. 19.—(AP)—Spurred to action by a plea of Weber county beet growers that they lack money with which to pay their taxes—the deadline on which is tomorrow—Governor Henry H. Blood has sent a telegram to AAA officials in Washington asking them to speed up the mailing of sugar checks to farmers.

J. R. Beus of Hooper, president, and J. J. Gibson of Taylor, vice president, of the Weber County Beet Growers association, complained to Governor Blood yesterday that Weber county beet growers have complied with all requirements of the AAA crop adjustment program, but have failed to receive checks for their share of the processing tax on sugar.

## Small Boy Dies of Accidental Wounds

LOGAN, Dec. 19.—Larry Alexander Olsen, 5-year-old son of Lee and Catherine Fletcher Olsen, of College, died at the William Budge Memorial hospital Tuesday about two hours after he had been accidentally shot by his 12-year-old brother, Warren Olsen.

The .22 rifle bullet entered near the left shoulder in the boy's back and came out the left side of the chest, lodging in the boy's left wrist. The boy evidently had his hand up to his face at the time.
