Dear Mr. Popkins,

I am in receipt of your letter dated April 5, 1989 expressing concern as to the lack of knowledge regarding preservation plans for the LeFever family burial site located at Hillside which is now part of the Broadlands planned community.


The burial site location was identified during the completion of an environmental study by Versar, Inc. on October 31, November 2 and 3, 1988. The burial site is reportedly located on parcel 55 behind the dairy facility. By copy of this letter to our civil engineering/surveying consultant, Christopher Consultants Ltd., I am requesting the exact location to be determined by field survey and shown on all drawings prepared for the Broadlands project.

Based on the approximate location, I am under the impression that the family burial plot is located within an area identified on present concept plans as "park land". I envision the family burial plot to remain undisturbed during any land development and/or construction activities, the burial plot to be delineated with some type of fencing, and the area to be cleared of any brush or undergrowth and seeded with a quality grass mixture. There after, depending on the desires of the family members, maintenance would be completed on an on going basis by family member or their representatives, or the family could contribute a mutually agreed upon one time amount to the Broadlands Homeowners Association and maintenance of the family plot would then be part of the overall community maintenance program.

Again, I wish to emphasize that I do not intend to disrupt the LeFever family burial site, no matter where the site may be located. Consideration for relocation would be given only in the event of some interference with regional improvements required by a governmental agency.

I appreciate your concern in this matter and will forward a concept plan with the family burial plot location as soon as the survey and drafting work is completed. Your desires as to maintenance options discussed above would also be helpful.

Dear Mrs. Carter,

In talking with a gentleman from the Preservation Committee for Loudoun County he informed me that you had contacted him concerning the designating Hillside as a preservation site and/or a concern for same. He also informed me that he did not think that you knew of the developer's plans in that immediate area, especially Broadland. Hence, the reason for this letter.

I, of course, have no connection what-so-ever with the developer. I am only a family member, and one of many who are concerned with the preservation of Hillside. We have moved in a positive direction just recently, and I am enclosing a letter from the Van Metre Corporation that addresses this concern with their plan.

Of course, like a lot of other things today, this will have to be checked at regular intervals. I plan to photograph and record the status later this fall. I have not received their plan from the draftsman as of this date.

I have enclosed a copy of the LeFever "tree" as we know it that relates to Hillside. If you have additional information, I would certainly like to know more. Mrs. John Cooke (Elizabeth) of Ashburn is the true worker and keeper of the family tree in the LeFever lineage.

I trust this information will be of value and interest to you. If I can provide you with any additional information needed, please let me know. I understand that development in the Waxpool area had slowed considerably recently, but with the passage of the Broadlands "plan", I imagine it will really start up now.

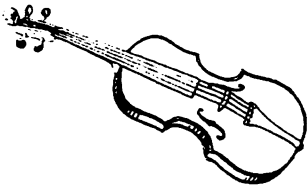

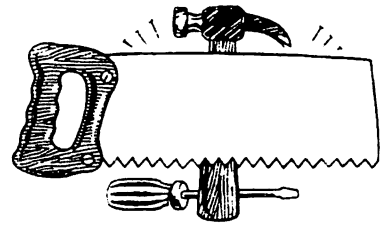

Granddaddy was a little wire like man, much like a cat, scurrying to the top of buildings to add tin roofs.

I think of his garden. He always planted his potatoes on St. Patrick's Day.

I think of his cinder block workshop in the back yard and its wonderful assortment of "things", nails and tin snips and all kinds of things a child would love to rummage through.

I think of the barn at the back of the lot and of cows or calves.

I think of the meat house out from the back porch.

I think of him sitting at the west kitchen window with a large round mirror and his shaving mug and his straight edge razor, giving himself a shave in the bright clear light.

I think of him playing the fiddle. I only wish I had heard him play more, he played so well.

I remember how he would blow smoke rings for us. We thought he had some "magical power".

I remember how he would tease us and "Miss Lucy Birch". "Miss Lucy lived down the street and was an old maid. She always was very "prim" and "proper", and would be insulted by the slightest thing. We were always so careful that we didn't say anything to upset her-not Granddaddy-he could say anything to her and she would never get mad. He would say "My God, here comes Lucy, just in time to eat". But when she left, he always loaded her down with vegetables from his garden-especially "tomatoes" as she called them.

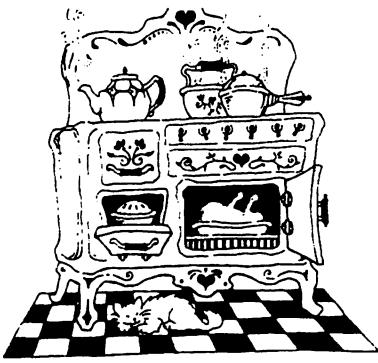
I remember Granddaddy did not like dogs, and as a joke we put a big bow around one of Daddy's beagle pups and took it up to him as a gift on April Fools Day.

I think of her frightening asthma attacks, that would scare me to death.

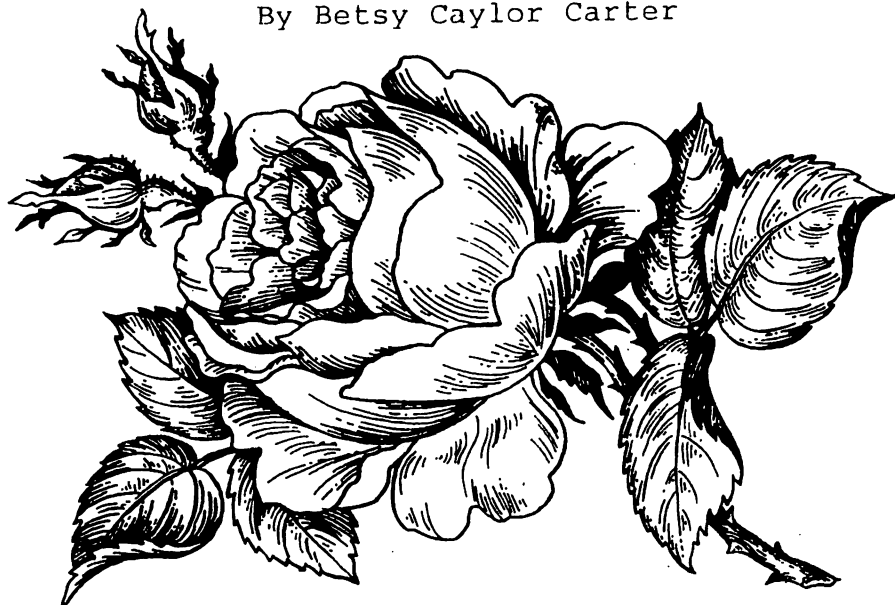
I think of the pampas grass that grew in her front yard and the dainty little daffodils with the deep orange, almost red center that grew in the flower bed on the east side of the house.

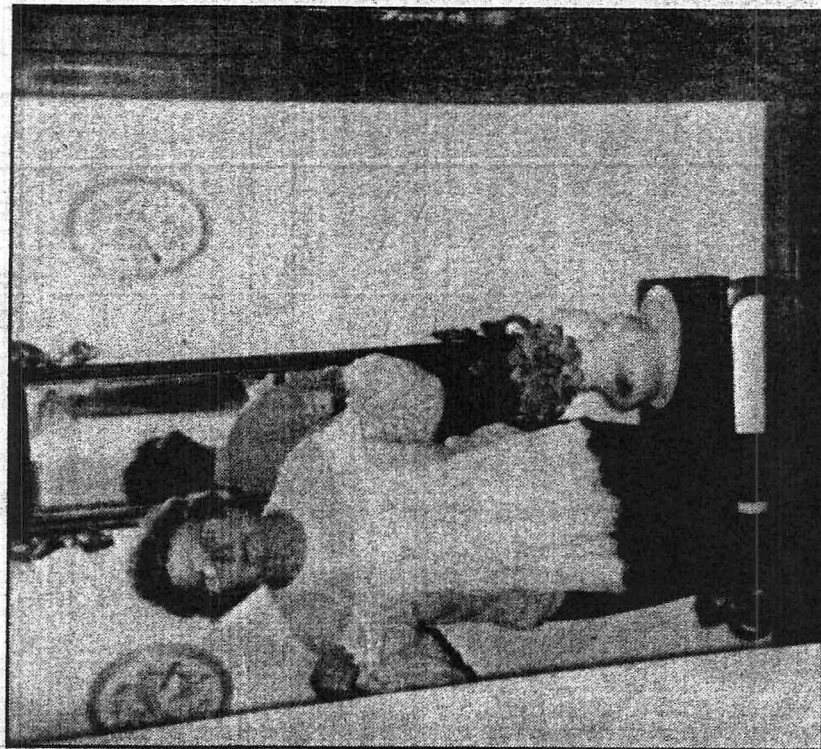

Clarence Connor "Pete" Caylor, 86, of Leesburg, died July 19. Born in Ashburn, Mr. Caylor was a truck driver, delivering milk from dairy farms in Loudoun to locations in Washington, DC. He also worked for the federal government's Carpet Department at the U.S. Capitol building. Mr. Caylor also played for the Ashburn team of the Loudoun County Baseball League and served in the U.S. Army during World War II. He is survived by his daughters Betsy Jane Carter of Aldie and Barbara Jean Patasce of Pasadena, MD; grandsons Michael Patrick Carter of Aldie, Vincent Whitmer of Leesburg and David Karper of Palm Coast, FL; great-grandchildren Abbey Carter and Patrick Carter of Aldie and Hanna Whitmer and Bronson Whitmer of Leesburg; and sister Marion "Bootie" Eamich of Ashburn. He was predeceased by three sisters and five brothers. Funeral services were held July 22 at Colonial Funeral Home with the Rev. Charles Grant officiating. WWII veteran, baseball player

Clarence Connor "Pete" Caylor, 86, of Leesburg, died July 19.

He was born June 9, 1918, in Ashburn to Milton Edward and Mary Susan Voding Caylor.

Mr. Caylor served in the Army during World War II and was employed as a milk truck driver for almost 20 years, taking milk from Loudoun County dairy farms to Washington, D.C. He later worked for and retired from the federal government's Carpet Department at the U.S. Capitol building.

Pete was well known for his love of, and talent for, baseball. He played for the Ashburn team of the Loudoun Baseball League during the 1930s, '40s and '50s.

Survivors include a sister, Marion Eamich of Ashburn; two daughters, Betsy Jane Carter of Aldie,

and Barbara Jean Patasce of Pasadena, Md.; three grandsons; and four great-grandchildren.

Burial was held July 22 at Union Cemetery in Leesburg.

When baseball was the game here

Clarence Connor "Pete" Caylor's recent passing revived many memories of how baseball used to be played in Loudoun County.

As a member of an Ashburn team in the Loudoun Baseball League during the 1930s, '40s and '50s, he was a multitalented player.

Caylor, 86, of Leesburg, died July 19 in the midst of enjoying the sport he loved most — baseball.

His brother-in-law Bunky Bodmer had called Caylor that evening to let him know a baseball game was on television. Caylor headed to his favorite recliner to watch the game. He died later that night.

"He could wear the daylight out of a pitcher because he could run the bases so fast," Bodmer said of Caylor's ability during his baseball-playing days.

Caylor played left field on the Ashburn team that enjoyed a dominant run in the early 1950s.

Ashburn won the Loudoun Baseball League championship three straight years, from 1950 to 1952.

"He probably knows more about baseball than anybody I knew," said Babe Ruth State Commissioner Don Rose.

"He was an avid player and a real competitor," Rose said. "His knowledge of baseball was unreal, and his compassion for the game was unmatched."

The baseball league regularly drew large crowds to the Ashburn baseball diamond, which is now located behind the Ashburn School Annex. The games turned into a county-wide affair on Sunday afternoons.

Caylor was one of the league's most prominent players. He was so adept at running down fly balls in the outfield that onlookers often joked that he must be hiding an extra ball

in his glove.

Many people told Caylor's daughter, Betsy Jane Carter, of Aldie, that he had the skills to play in the major leagues had he not served in the Army during World War II.

Caylor was born June 9, 1918, in Ashburn to the late Milton Edward and Mary Susan Voding Caylor. He was employed for 20 years as a milk truck driver and later worked for and retired from the federal government's Carpet Department at the U.S. Capitol. He was predeceased by his wife, Charlicie B. Caylor.

He is also survived by his sister, Marion Eamich, of Ashburn; his daughter, Barbara Jean Patasce, of Pasadena, Md.; three grandsons; and four great-grandchildren.

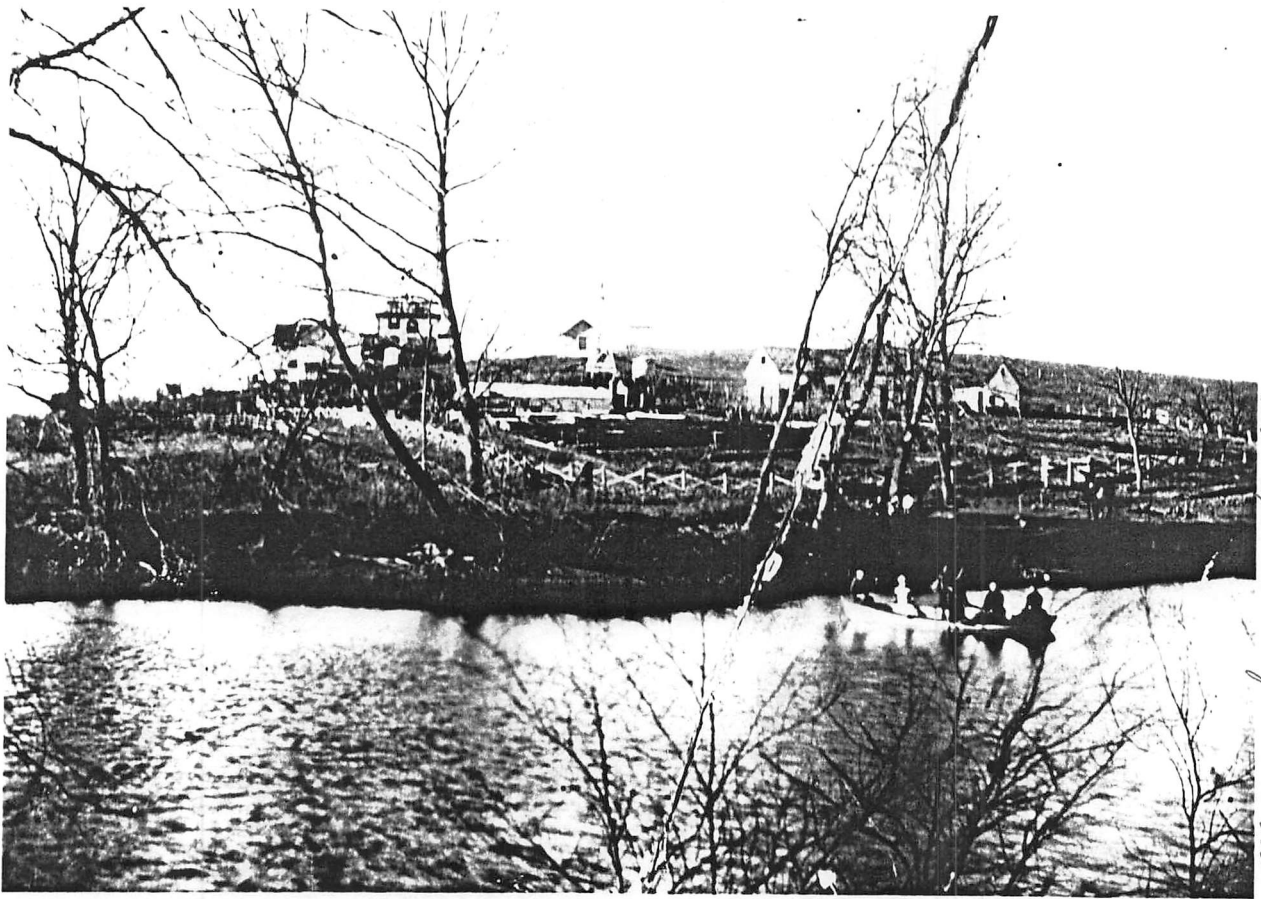

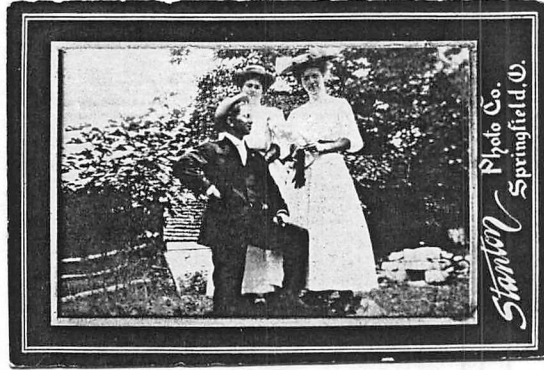

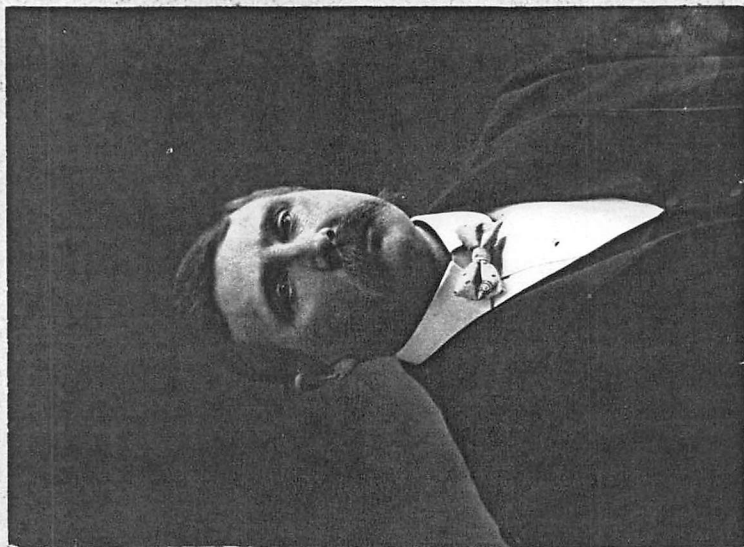
