## FIGHTING THE BEAN BEETLE

### COUNTY AGENT DERR GIVES VALUABLE ADVICE

A new Farmers Bulletin has just been issued by the U. S. Dept. of Agriculture. It is No. 1624 and deals with the Mexican Bean Beetle and its control. This bulletin recommends the use of Magnesium Arsenate used as spray, at the rate of 2 pounds of the arsenate to 100 gallons of water. For small acreage use one ounce of the Arsenate to 3 gallons of water. The liquid must reach the underside of the leaves and must be done thoroughly. One three sometimes four sprayings are usually required. Begin spraying as soon as the adults are found in the field, or when you see egg masses on the under side of the leaves. This bulletin states to stop spraying when the pods are formed. We have found it necessary to spray as long as we found the beetles present, as it was the late hatching beetles that hibernated and live over the winter.

As important as thorough spraying is the plowing under of the plant remains, at least 6 inches deep, after the crop is harvested. One careless neighbour who fails to do this can ruin the efforts of a whole neighbouring community.

Dusting may be practised but does not give as good results as spraying. Last year when we used Calcium Arsenate mixture for dusting in many cases the foliage or bloom were injured.

The bean beetle has been with us several years and we have learned some lessons from its attacks. We find that in localities where there was a plentiful supply of the little red black and spotted lady bird, or bug as some call it, was present the beetles were not so plentiful.

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


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# AN HISTORICAL GUIDE

## 1875: The Original Crossman Methodist Church

*North Washington Street at East Columbia Street*

Crossman Methodist Church was the second church established in Falls Church after the Civil War divided the earlier Fairfax Chapel congregation; its congregation belonged to the northern Methodist branch. The original wooden structure, with a prominent steeple, was built about 1875 on land donated by Isaac Crossman. It was demolished in 1963. The current building was constructed in 1957.
