## Adam Caylor of Loudoun County, Virginia, and Ross & Fayette counties, Ohio

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### RESEARCH OBJECTIVE

Collect all evidence to show the parentage of Adam Caylor as well as his children and siblings.

### ITEMIZED RESEARCH RESULTS

This is a listing of all documented evidence of Adam Caylor in Loudoun County, Virginia and in Ross and Fayette counties, Ohio. This is complete as of Nov 2007.

All available deeds, wills, militia service records, chancery court records in Ohio, census records, vital records, personal property tax records, tithable tax records, and land tax records have been reviewed for all three counties for the period 1758 – 1850. One group of records that I've not yet examined is the court orders from Loudoun County.

Although this is a listing of events for Adam Caylor, it's important to distinguish between Jacob Caylor and wife Catherine and a second Jacob Caylor and his wife Catherine, both of who were in Fayette County, Ohio at the same time. One Jacob was older than the other and I'll use Jacob Caylor 1 for this person (born in Loudoun Co, Virginia, in 1775, married Catherine Etcher about 1802 in Loudoun, died 1848 in Fayette Co, Ohio). The younger Jacob is called Jacob Caylor 2 (unsure of birth location, married Catherine Snider in 1811 in Fayette Co, Ohio, died 1836 in Fayette Co, Ohio). Another research report on Jacob Caylor 2 will be prepared to make a case for his birth date, place, and parents.

Item	Date	Event (comments in italics)
1	Sept 1794	Adam Caler appeared on the Loudoun County Militia roster for the company commanded by Capt George Kilgore, 57 <sup>th</sup> Regiment. <sup>1</sup> <i>Had to be at least 18 years old at this time.</i>
2	Aug 1795	Adam Calor appeared as a tithable in the household of Barbary Calor who paid personal property taxes in Loudoun Co, 2 <sup>nd</sup> Battalion. <sup>2</sup>

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		<p><i>He was at least 16 at this time. He did not appear in the 1792 list when Barbary and Nicholas were listed so Adam was 15 or less in the summer of that year. The 1793 and 1794 lists contain none of their names (Barbary, Adam, Nicholas).</i></p>
3	13 Oct 1796	<p>Barbary Caler appeared in the Loudoun County personal property tax list, 2<sup>nd</sup> Battalion, with one tithable but no name listed and three horses.<sup>3</sup></p> <p><i>The tithable was likely Adam.</i></p>
4	10 Nov 1797	<p>Adam Calor appeared in the Loudoun County personal property tax lists, 2<sup>nd</sup> Battalion, as a free white male tithable over 21 with three horses.<sup>4</sup></p> <p><i>He was likely married by this date.</i></p>
5	1797-98	<p>Mary "Polly" Caylor was born at this time and was age 52 and 62 in the 1850<sup>5</sup> and 1860<sup>6</sup> censuses, respectively, and born in VA.</p> <p><i>She is a likely daughter of Adam.<sup>7</sup></i></p>
6	1798	<p>Adam Calor appeared in the Loudoun County personal property tax lists, 2<sup>nd</sup> Battalion, as a white male over 16 with two horses.<sup>8</sup></p>
7	4 May 1798	<p>Adam witnessed a land transaction (along with John Etcher, Wm H Haring, and Wm Veale) for the sale of 67 acres in Loudoun County by George Lee to Peter Oatyer.<sup>9</sup></p>
8	8 Apr 1799	<p>Adam Kaylor appeared in the Loudoun County personal property tax lists, 1<sup>st</sup> Battalion, as a white male over 16 with five horses.<sup>10</sup></p> <p><i>"Adam Kaylor" appeared in the 1<sup>st</sup> Battalion in the tax years 1799-1800, along with Andrew Kaylor and Jacob Kaylor. Andrew had always appeared in the 1<sup>st</sup> Battalion since 1787 until his last entry in 1802. It's curious that Adam appeared twice in the 1799 tax lists but appeared only once in all other tax years. Perhaps Adam took up farming with Andrew for a couple of years? I do not believe these 1799-1800 tax entries indicate there are two Adam Calor/Kaylors – there are no other records of two people. Note the spelling of the last name is unique to the battalion with the name spelled Kaylor in the 1<sup>st</sup> and Calor in the 2<sup>nd</sup>.</i></p>

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9	1 Jul 1799	Adam Calor appeared in the Loudoun County personal property tax lists, 2 <sup>nd</sup> Battalion, as a white male over 16 with one slave over age 16 and four horses. <sup>11</sup>
10	7 Apr 1800	Adam Kaylor appeared in the Loudoun County personal property tax lists, 1 <sup>st</sup> Battalion, as a free white male over 16. <sup>12</sup> In his household was Jacob Kaylor, tithable white male over age 16. They had six horses.
11	c. Jul 1800	<p>John P Caylor, likely son of Adam, was born in VA at this time. He was age 30-40 in the 1830 census,<sup>13</sup> 40-50 in the 1840 census,<sup>14</sup> 50 in the 1850 census,<sup>15</sup> 59 in the 1860 census<sup>16</sup> and 69 in the 1870 census.<sup>17</sup></p> <p><i>Based on the enumeration dates of each census (not the official census dates), his birth took place between 10 Jun – 2 Sep 1800. The case for John being the son of Adam is made by indirect evidence: John named his first son Adam and his first daughter Susan (after his father and mother); a biography in a history of Appanoose County stated he was born in Loudoun County, Virginia and that his father went to Ross County, Ohio in 1803 and then to Fayette County, Ohio in 1813 (this agrees with the family migrations – see below).<sup>18</sup> Also, John's birth date is consistent with those of his father's other children.</i></p>
12	18 Jul 1801	Adam Calor appeared in the Loudoun County personal property tax lists, 2 <sup>nd</sup> Battalion, as a free white male over 16 with three horses. <sup>19</sup>
13	1799-1803	Daughter Anne Calor born in VA; age 47 in 1850 census <sup>20</sup> and 60 in 1860 census. <sup>21</sup>
14	12 Jul 1802	Adam Calor appeared in the Loudoun County personal property tax lists, 2 <sup>nd</sup> Battalion, as a free white male over 16 with three horses. <sup>22</sup>
15	26 Mar 1803	Adam Calor appeared in the Loudoun County personal property tax lists, 2 <sup>nd</sup> Battalion, as a free white male over 16 with one slave over age 16 and three horses. <sup>23</sup>
16	9 Apr 1804	Adam Calor appeared in the Loudoun County personal property tax lists, 2 <sup>nd</sup> Battalion, as a free white male over 16 with one slave over age 16 and four horses. <sup>24</sup>
17	12 Mar 1805	Adam Calor appeared in the Loudoun County personal property tax lists, 2 <sup>nd</sup> Battalion, as a free white male over 16 with one slave over age 16 and four horses. <sup>25</sup>

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18	1806	Adam Calor did not appear in the Loudoun County 1806 or later tax lists. <i>Left Loudoun between Mar 1805 and mid-1806.</i>
19	1808	Adam Caler paid taxes in Ross Co OH. <sup>26</sup>
20	1809	Adam Caylor paid taxes in Concord Twp, Ross Co OH. <sup>27</sup>
21	1810	Adam Caller paid taxes in Ross Co OH. One property of 50 acres and a second of 111.5 acres on the north fork of the Paint River. <sup>28</sup>
22	May 1811	Adam Cayler posted an announcement in the local paper ( <i>The Scioto Gazette</i> ) regarding a note he had given Matthias Ruff for land in Pickaway County (Matthias had not produced a title), and an announcement that he wanted to hire a stiller who would be paid good wages and have constant employment. <sup>29</sup> Adam stated that he lived three miles from Old Town on the Little North Fork of Paint Creek.
23	Sep 1811	Another item in <i>The Scioto Gazette</i> stated Adam Caylor and Thomas Clossen appraised a horse for George Lease who was living in Ross Co, Concord Twp. <sup>30</sup>
24	5 Aug 1811	Adam Caylor of Ross Co OH bought 101.75 acres from Thomas Goldsbury of Ross Co. Land located on both sides of the north fork of Paint Creek. <sup>31</sup>
25	1809-12	Elizabeth, daughter, born in OH, age 38 in the 1850 census <sup>32</sup> and age 50 in the 1860 census. <sup>33</sup>
26	15 Aug 1812	Adam Caylor of Ross Co OH bought 10 acres from Thomas Goldsbury of Ross Co. Land located next to current property of Adam Caylor (purchased from Goldsbury in 1811). <sup>34</sup>
27	4 Jul 1815	Mary "Polly" Caylor, likely daughter of Adam Caylor, married John Jacob Gossard 4 Jul 1815 in Ross Co OH. <sup>35</sup> They had an oldest son named Adam Caylor Gossard, born 1 May 1816 in Twin Twp, Ross Co OH. <sup>36</sup>  <i>Mary was born 31 Mar 1796 in Loudoun Co VA and died 4 Jun 1868 in Tipton Co IN. This came from an e-mail by Tom Chandler (t_chandler70@yahoo.com - active in 2002) on the Caylor family genealogy forum of Genealogy.com, dated 15 Jan 2000 – no source cited. The year 1796 is not likely based on the personal property tax lists for Adam in</i>

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		<i>1796 and 1797 – the year 1797 is more likely for her birth.</i>
28	14 Nov 1815	Adam Caylor of Ross Co OH bought 301 acres from Thomas Holt of Harrison Co KY. Land located on Sugar Creek in Fayette Co, on a corner to property of Jacob Caylor 1 (purchased from Holt on 4 Nov 1815). <sup>37</sup>
29	1816	Adam Caller paid taxes in Concord Twp, Ross Co OH. <sup>38</sup> The same two properties as taxed in 1810 with the note that the original proprietor of the 111.5 acreage was Peter F Archer.
30	1817	Adam Caller paid taxes in Concord Twp, Ross Co OH. <sup>39</sup> The same two properties as taxed in 1810 with the note on both entries that Adam was delinquent for 1816. There was no entry for Adam in the 1818 tax records. <i>It is likely that Adam left Ross Co for Fayette Co about 1816.</i>
31	c. 1818	After 1810 and before 1820 Adam Caylor built a gristmill on Sugar Creek in Fayette Co, Concord Twp. <sup>40</sup> He later added a saw mill and whiskey distiller to the gristmill. <i>Clearly, Adam extended his whiskey business from Ross County to Fayette County!</i>
32	8 Jan 1820	Adam Caylor appraised the estate of Michael Miller, deceased, of Fayette Co OH. He also gave security of \$2000 with William Thompson. <sup>41</sup>
33	1820	Adam Caylor paid taxes in Fayette Co for three tracts of land: 408 acres (part of Thomas Holt's original 1000 acres, survey #819), 24 acres (part of Clement Biddles's original 1000 acres, survey #680), and 49 acres (part of William Barrett's original 1150 acres, survey #626). <sup>42</sup>
34	12 Jun 1820	Adam Caylor and wife Susannah of Fayette Co OH sold 77 acres to Frederick Noacher of Ross Co. Land was on Paint Creek and was part of Adam's 1811 purchase. <sup>43</sup>
35	7 Aug 1820	Adam Caylor appeared in the 1820 census for Ohio, Fayette Co, Concord Twp. Household: one male 16-18, one male >45, one female <10, one female 16-26, one female 26-45. <sup>44</sup>
36	1821	Adam Caylor paid taxes in 1821 in Fayette Co on the same property as he paid in 1820. <sup>45</sup>
37	19 Apr 1821	Adam Caylar and wife Susanah of Fayette Co sold 200

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		acres on Deer Creek in Fayette and Pickaway counties to Samuel Waddle of Fayette Co. <sup>46</sup>
38	19 Nov 1821	Adam Calar and wife Susannah sold 100 acres on Sugar Creek in Fayette Co to Hugh Conon of Fayette Co. Part of land purchased Nov 1815. <sup>47</sup>
39	28 Feb 1822	Mr Jacob Wright married Miss Anna Caylor 28 Feb 1822 in Fayette Co OH. <sup>48</sup> <i>Anna was daughter of Adam and mentioned in his will.</i>
40	1822	Adam Caylor paid taxes in 1822 in Fayette Co on the same property as he paid in 1820 and 1821. <sup>49</sup>
41	18 Jul 1822	Sheriff made a deed to Albert Stephens for 66.5 acres in survey 911 of Fayette Co. Property was previously sold to Stephens in the case of Adam Caylor vs. Adam Miller (this may be relation of Michael Miller of item dated 8 Jan 1820). <sup>50</sup>
42	1823	Adam Caylor paid taxes in 1823 in Fayette Co <sup>51</sup> on the same property as he paid in 1820, 1821 and 1822. <i>The Thomas Holt property was reduced to 308 acres indicating the 19 Nov 1821 sale caught up to the tax records.</i>
43	19 Jul 1823	Adam Caylor and wife Susannah of Fayette Co sold 100 acres on the Rattlesnake Branch of Paint Creek to Thomas and Priscilla Clark of Clinton Co OH. <sup>52</sup>
44	1824	Adam Caylor paid taxes in 1824 in Fayette Co on two properties: the 24-acre land of survey #680 and the 49-acre survey #626. <sup>53</sup>
45	29 Oct 1824	Adam Caylor and wife Susannah of Fayette Co sold plat #70 in the town of Washington [Court House] to John Coar of Ross Co. <sup>54</sup>
46	29 Oct 1824	Adam Caylor and wife Susannah of Fayette Co sold 24 acres on main Paint Creek near Washington [Court House] to John Coar of Ross Co. <sup>55</sup>
47	18 Aug 1826	Adam Caylor of Ross County, Ohio, bought 116 acres for \$125 in Adams County, Ohio, from Richard C Anderson and his wife Sarah through attorney Allan Latham of Jefferson County, Kentucky. The land was on the waters of Hills fork of Eagle Creek, part of Thomas Hills survey. <sup>56</sup>
48	11 Mar 1830	Elizabeth Caylor married James Rowbuck [Robuck or

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		Roebuck] in Adams Co OH. <sup>57</sup> <i>Elizabeth was daughter of Adam, per will of Adam.</i>
49	1 Jun 1830	Cannot locate in 1830 census.
50	1833	Adam Caylor paid land tax on 116.5 acres (survey 798) on the east fork of Eagle Creek in Liberty Township, Adams Co OH. <sup>58</sup>
51	1833	Adam Cayler paid property tax in Liberty Township, Adams Co, OH: 3 horses and 1 cow.
52	Mar-Dec 1833	“Adam Kailer” bought property at the sale of inventory from the estate of John Axline in Loudoun Co. <i>This is most likely not the Adam Caylor who lived in Ohio at this time but this Adam’s parentage and family are unknown.</i>
53	1834	Adam Caylor paid land tax on 100 acres (survey 798) on the east fork of Eagle Creek in Liberty Township, Adams Co OH. <sup>59</sup> In the same year James Robuck paid tax on 16.5 acres (survey 798) on the east fork of Eagle Creek in Liberty Township. <sup>60</sup> <i>Neither man paid taxes in Adams Co in 1835 or 1836.</i>
54	1834	Adam Cayler paid property tax in Liberty Township, Adams Co, OH: 1 horse and 1 cow.
55	8 May 1834	Adam Cayler sold 116 acres in Adams County, Ohio, for \$75 to Thomas Kincaid Jun. on 8 May 1834. The property was adjacent to property of Aaron Robuck, Thomas Kincaid and James Robuck. Adam signed by his mark.
56	12 Mar 1835	Adam Caylor and wife Susan of Adams County sold land on the waters of Eagle Creek in Adams County to Abel Tumbleson [Tomlinson or Tomilsan] of Adams Co. Amount paid was \$300 and the land was part of the original survey #798 by Thomas Hills. Adam and Susan signed with their marks. <sup>61</sup> The 1835 land tax records show that Tumbleson paid taxes on 116.5 acres on the East Fork of Eagle Creek, original survey #798. <sup>62</sup>
57	1835	Adam Caylor paid taxes in Fayette Co in 1835. He had one horse and one cow. <sup>63</sup>
58	7 Oct 1838	Adam Caylor made his last will and testament in Fayette

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		Co. He named two daughters: Amy Wright and Elizabeth Robuck. He gave the use of the land he now lived on to his beloved wife [not named]. <sup>64</sup>
59	1 Jun 1840	Adam Caylor appeared in the 1840 census for Ohio, Fayette Co, Concord Twp. Household: one male 60-70, one female 50-60 with one person engaged in agriculture. <sup>65</sup> <i>The family of Jacob Wright was enumerated next to that of Adam Caylor.</i>
60	4 Dec 1841	Will proved in Fayette Co court. <sup>66</sup>
61	6 Sep 1850	Susan Caylor, age 75 and born in VA, lived in the household of Jacob and Anne Wright in Concord Twp, Fayette Co OH, with their daughter Susan and son William. Anne was listed as age 47 and born in VA. <sup>67</sup> <i>Anne was daughter of Adam, per will of Adam.</i>

#### ANALYSIS OF ITEMIZED RESULTS

Adam's appearance with Barbary Calor in the Loudoun tithables lists is examined more closely in the research report on Barbary Calor – she is undoubtedly his mother.

Adam's militia roster record suggests a birth date before Sep 1776.

His first appearance on the personal property tax list in Aug 1795 suggests a birth date before Aug 1779 but he could have appeared on this tax list as early as 1793 (the 1793 and 1794 records do not list any Calor in the 2<sup>nd</sup> Battalion), and this would place his birth date before, say, Jun 1777. Since he did not appear on the 1792 personal property list as a tithable he had not reached his 16<sup>th</sup> birthday by that time so he was born after, say, Jun 1776.

His appearance on the personal property tax list 10 Nov 1797 as a tithable over 21 suggests a birth date before 10 Nov 1776. Since he didn't appear independently in the list of 1796 (he was likely the unnamed tithable between 16-21 in the household of Barbary Caler), his birth date was likely between, say, Jun 1775 and Nov 1776.

Based on the above, Adam's proposed birth date: Jun 1776 – Sep 1776.

His independent appearance in the 1797 tax list suggests he was married by Nov 1797 and not before Oct 1796.

The evidence for Adam's wife's name is scant and indirect. Her given name is either Susannah, which she used in making her mark in deeds,<sup>68, 69</sup> or Susan, the name given the 1850 census enumerator.<sup>70</sup> Based on the 1850 census she



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was born in Virginia in 1774-75. We know that one of Peter Oatyer's daughters, Catherine, married Jacob Caylor<sup>71</sup> and that Jacob and Catherine migrated first to Ross County, Ohio then to Fayette County. We also know that Peter had another daughter, Ann, who also married a Caylor<sup>72</sup>. Only two Caylor men in Loudoun were of an age to marry Ann – Andrew Caylor and Adam Caylor. Andrew was likely married by 1783 when Ann would have been only 8-9 so only Adam Caylor is the likely husband of Ann. Ann/Susan/Susannah Oatyer are judged to be the same person. The fact that the family of Adam Caylor also migrated first to Ross County then to Fayette County and lived close by Catherine and Jacob is more indirect evidence of this second Caylor/Oatyer marriage.
